Dear Ms. Karen Redman and Ms. Natasha Salonen,

Re: Concern about Land acquisition in Wilmot Township, Waterloo Region

I am addressing you both as appointed spokespeople for Waterloo Region regarding the recent and sudden offers by a US based company to purchase "shovel-ready" farmland in Wilmot Township on behalf of the Region for a rumoured industrial development.

I spent a good portion of my growing up years in Wilmot Township on a thriving dairy farm that is still in the family. I now own a home in the City of Kitchener and work for the University of Guelph.

The challenge of "development" cuts across urban and rural communities. So often those of us in a city have little sense of life in the country, especially for farmers, though we benefit from their labour and production in tangible and life-giving ways, everyday. The slogan, "Farmers Feed Cities," is not just a slogan, it is a truth we ignore at our peril. In the same way, cities also provide services to rural dwellers that they would be hard-pressed, at least in this modern era, to do without. We need each other.

It is imperative, therefore, that I speak out against taking prime and actively farmed land out of production for a rumoured industrial project with the following concerns:

- 1. As some have noted, agriculture is industry in Canada so this move pits one type of industry against another! Why is factory production more relevant or beneficial to the economy and community than agriculture? Why not work at creating "shovel-ready" land using what is already degraded as asked by affected farmer, Mr. Lowrick, in his presentation to Wilmot Council on March 25?
- 2. Waterloo Region has stood tall in its <u>commitment to a hard boundary between the city and the country</u> because we care about the environment and have a holistic view of a healthy, mixed economy. How does this development relate to that policy?
- 3. I am deeply <u>saddened by, and disappointed in, the secrecy of the project to date</u>. I do understand there are times when a quiet approach makes sense, but strict NDA's immediately cause mistrust and quickly become counterproductive to communication and dialogue. I strongly encourage you as leaders to find your way to clarity, openness, and transparency with integrity first with those most directly impacted: the farmers; and then with us, the broader community who are watching and concerned.
